# Domestic abuse - spotting the signs and accessing support

**Domestic abuse can happen to anyone, regardless of age, background, gender identity, sex, religion, sexual orientation or ethnicity. However, statistics show most domestic abuse is carried out by men and experienced by women.**

Across England and Wales, 1 in 4 women will experience abuse in their lifetime and on average, one woman is killed by an abusive partner or ex every five days. \*

This month, we'll be signposting towards resources, guidance, and support helplines, from a variety of charities and organisations, including Refuge. **There are several definitions of the many different types of domestic abuse which can be experienced - below are some examples from Refuge:**

Definitions and types of domestic abuse

- **Psychological/emotional abuse:** Includes name-calling, threats and manipulation, blaming you for the abuse or 'gaslighting' you.
- **Coercive control:** When an abuser uses a pattern of behaviour over time to exert power and control. It is a criminal offence.
- **Physical abuse:** This isn't only hitting. He might restrain you or throw objects. He might pinch or shove you and claim it's a 'joke'.
- **Tech abuse:** He might send abusive texts, demand access to your devices, track you with spyware, or share images of you online.
- **Economic abuse:** Controlling your access to money or resources. He might take your wages, stop you working, or put you in debt without your knowledge or consent
- **Sexual abuse:** This doesn't have to be physical. He might manipulate, deceive or coerce you into doing things you don't want to do.

## Supporting a survivor

It can be hard to know how to support a friend or loved one who is experiencing domestic abuse. Your first instinct may be to protect them, but intervening directly can be dangerous for you and them. There are ways you can help though. Read more on [our website](#) or [Refuge's](#).

# Congratulations to our survey prize draw winners!

In October 2024, we ran our annual Crime and Community survey, and received 25,483 responses to the survey - an incredible amount! This annual survey studies the experience of respondents in relation to crime, fear of crime, and their connection with their local community. The results have been written up and will be available soon on our website.

As usual, we can see from the results of this survey that Neighbourhood Watch members are much more likely to do more for neighbours, and have a closer connection and sense of belonging to their area.

The top 3 crimes people worry about, according to the survey, are **antisocial behaviour (69%), having your home broken into (50%) and cybercrime (45%)**. Some crimes are feared in similar percentages by different age groups, whereas others are age-dependent. For example, 50% of over 65s fear cybercrime, compared to 43% of 44-64 year-olds and 26% of Under 44's. In contrast, only 21% of over 65s fear physical assault, compared to 33% of 44-64s and 39% of Under 44s.

There was a prize draw as an incentive to participate in this survey, and we have now plucked 3 lucky winners from this anonymous draw, who will each receive £25 Amazon vouchers! In doing this, Lynne also represented Merseyside at the regular Association Leads meetings, providing a voice from her force area. She has learnt new skills, using our membership database, working closely with the Neighbourhood Policing and Citizens in Policing teams in Merseyside as well. Lynne has sat in our focus groups about building membership, and is a very valuable, friendly and thorough-minded Chair, as well as an an asset to Merseyside. For the short period of time that Lynne has led her team, we are so proud of the impact on the partners, members and volunteers, that she has had."

# Launching the new Youth Watch at Cressex Community School



**We are delighted to announce that there was a meeting on 21st November at Cressex Community School to launch our first Youth Watch scheme.** This is not just the first such scheme in the Wycombe district - we have reason to believe it is the first one in the wider area of Thames Valley Police, and probably in an even greater area beyond!

Cressex Community School is a modern secondary school, and the scheme has been launched to help make its 750+ pupils more aware of the crimes that can affect their lives, both in the school and away from it, and to work together to find ways to avoid them.

In the previous weeks, members of the school management team have been very supportive to bring this to a successful conclusion. This was brought about with 40 pupils attending the meeting, along with members of the school's management team. Further meetings are being planned in the New Year to make the Cressex Community School's Youth Watch a success in the future. Two members of the school's management team have signed up as Neighbourhood Watch Co-ordinators!

# Spotlight on local NW groups: we hear from Bolton Neighbourhood Watch



**As we continue to build links within the community and with other organisations across Bolton, November saw us attending our first event as a Bolton Network.**

We had already built a good working relationship with the Community Safety Team based at Bolton Council, and they invited us along to the ASB Awareness Day event held in the Market Place shopping centre in Bolton Town Centre. We also received visits from the town centre policing team and representatives from the Community Safety Team.

This event was followed by a second ASB awareness event that was hosted for the community by local housing provider, Your Housing Group, who we had already formed close links with by working with them to help reduce ASB and prevent criminal activity on one of their new developments.

At the end of the month, we were invited by Westhoughton Town Council, who recently signed up to the Community Safety Charter, to attend the Christmas Fair and lights switch on being held in the town. We joined other local groups and the local policing team and were able to provide crime prevention advice to a number of residents. We were also approached by a number of people who had previously been victims of scammers, and we were able to offer advice to help prevent them being secondary victims to the criminals and direct them to other services who could support them as victims of crime.

We have now been invited to speak to the local NHS team's Health and Care Partnership, where we will be able to discuss the links between health and crime, and we have also been asked to be guest speakers at the Women of Westhoughton group, a member of the National Association of Women's Clubs, at one of their monthly meetings.

None of this would have been possible without the support of the Neighbourhood Watch Network Central Support Team or Greater Manchester Neighbourhood Watch Association, to which we are eternally grateful. These strong local and national links show the importance of the excellent structure and support that has been put in place throughout the charity, and highlights how Neighbourhood Watch through local partnerships can play a vital role in building safer and stronger communities.
